Guidance for companies seeking the Inspectorate's support for schemes being submitted as part of the PR24 cost change process

1. Purpose

 This letter sets out the Inspectorate's expectations of companies in respect of schemes being submitted to it for support, as part of Ofwat's PR24 cost change process.

2. Background and changes

- i. In its final determination for PR24, Ofwat acknowledged uncertainty in the areas of PFAS and cyber security and announced a cost change process, whereby companies could apply for an in-period adjustment in order to deliver significant new schemes.
- ii. Application windows for schemes will open in 2026, 2027 and 2028.
- iii. The Inspectorate expects to receive for assessment and the determination of support, all schemes being submitted for PFAS, cyber security and asset health (for drinking water assets only).
- iv. Companies should present schemes in the same manner as for all other periodic review schemes, setting out the risks, options, preferred option and costs, as well as up to date regulation 28 reports for drinking water quality schemes.

- v. For asset health schemes (where the Inspectorate's support is requested), companies will additionally need to demonstrate how a deterioration in the health of the assets concerned, represents a risk to drinking water quality. The Inspectorate also seeks assurance that any assets put forward for these schemes are the priority for protecting drinking water quality and that the company has no other drinking water assets which present a greater risk in respect of asset health. Companies should provide schematic diagrams to the Inspectorate, in their submissions, explaining why the asset health of certain assets, and not others, are presenting a water quality risk.
- vi. For cyber security schemes, companies will additionally need to demonstrate that the need for the scheme originates from new or changed legal requirements, new or changed legislation or a change in threat level.
- vii. For PFAS schemes, companies should additionally demonstrate the prioritisation of any schemes submitted over those not submitted.
- viii. As with Periodic Review schemes, companies will be issued with letters of support, commend for support or decline for support. The Inspectorate will put legal instruments in place to cover the delivery of supported schemes and Acknowledged Actions will be used to track the delivery of commended schemes.
- ix. In each year of the cost change process (2026, 2027 and 2028), the Inspectorate will work to the following timetable;
 - Ahead of 31 March, the Inspectorate welcomes discussion with companies on their proposed plans. Please contact Simon Benton to arrange.
 - By 31 March, draft plans for schemes should be submitted to the Inspectorate for assessment.
 - By 30 April, decision letters will be issued to companies (unless extensive queries cause delay).
 - By 31 May, the Inspectorate expects the majority of legal instruments or acknowledged actions to be in place.
 - Early submissions are encouraged and welcomed.

- xi. Companies should submit drinking water quality schemes using Annex B to the Inspectorate's Price Review mailbox DWIPriceReview@defra.gov.uk.
- xii. Companies should use Annex C to detail cyber security schemes and upload these to the company's enforcement returns area on Resilience Direct. The upload should be followed with a notification email to DWIPriceReview@defra.gov.uk.
